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HOUSE BILL 555 WILL CHANGE SCHOOL REPORT CARDS

House Bill 555 would move from rating schools using current labels such as "Excellent" and "Continuous Improvement" to an A-F grading system. The goal is to make the rating labels easier to understand, but it will also make it harder for schools to get a top grade. The reason it will be more difficult to get a top grade is two-fold. First the passage rates or cut scores for the tests will be increased, which means students will need to score higher on the test in order to be considered proficient, and the rigor of the tests themselves are going to increase.



The bill would also:

- Revise district report cards to include the creation of a "dashboard" of individual grades in areas including state test scores, student growth and college/career readiness;
 - Delay awarding schools a single overall letter grade until 2014-15; and
- Create a separate grading system for charter schools serving students who have dropped out of other schools.

House Bill 555 has a number of areas of concern for Kalida Local Schools, and public schools in general. The Kalida Board of Education sent the inserted letter to a number of members of the Ohio General Assembly in an attempt to persuade them to make changes to House Bill 555. Some, but not all, of the changes suggested by Kalida Local Schools and a large number of other districts and public education organizations were incorporated into the Ohio Senate version of the bill. It is very likely Kalida Local Schools will see a very different result than we are used to on the next District Report Card. The next District Report Card will reflect the measure of a large number of changes. The curriculum has been changed with a move to the Ohio Core Curriculum, the assessments have been changed and made more difficult, and the score needed to pass the assessments will be increased.

PSAT and PLAN Results - Results for the PSAT and PLAN (Pre-ACT for sophomores) assessments will be arriving soon. These results will be shared with students in late December or early January.

Juniors: Don't Forget the ACT!!

Parents of juniors are encouraged to remind their child to register and take the ACT at least 2-3 times before their senior year. The ACT is one of two college entrance exams – the other being the SAT - required by most schools for admission. The ACT is the more dominant of the two for schools in Ohio and the Midwest. Colleges will accept either test. The ACT is offered 6 times a year Remaining tests for this school year are in February, April, and June. The deadline to register for the test in February is January 11. Students must register online at www.actstudent.org. Fee waivers for the ACT are available in the guidance office for students who may qualify because of financial need. One new requirement beginning this year is that each student must upload a picture of himself or herself into the online account. Upon completing registration, a student must print out a registration ticket with the photo on it. This form along with another form of picture ID (driver's license, etc.) must be taken to the test site in order to be permitted to test.

Seniors: Don't Forget the FAFSA!!

Parents of seniors who will be attending college next fall are reminded to complete the Free Application for Student Assistance (FAFSA). The FAFSA is the governmental form which must be filled out by the student and his/her parent(s) in order to determine the student's eligibility for financial aid. Many colleges and universities also require that it be filled out if a student wishes to be considered for funds or scholarships that the respective schools distribute. Beginning January 1 for this year's seniors, parents and students can access the application at www.fafsa.ed.gov What can you do right now? Parents and students can apply for a pin number which will be your electronic signature for the FAFSA. The student and at least one parent need a pin number. You can obtain this at www.pin.ed.gov. A good goal for completion of the FAFSA is mid-February. Most schools have certain deadlines for completion of the FAFSA - some as early as the middle of February. Parents and students are highly encouraged to call a college's financial aid office or check their websites for these dates.
